New phones, schedule, greet students

After much effort, and patience, Trevecca now has a new, up-to-date phone system. The new computerized system replaces the old one which was characterized by busy signals and disconnections. All offices and dorm rooms have now been equipped with modern push-button phones, with the switchboard itself receiving a simple console.

The beginning of Fall Quarter always brings some changs to a campus but the record number of students coming to Trevecca this year have noticed more than usual. Improvements to buildings have reached out beyond McClurkan and Fine Arts, and additional space has been added to the Benson parking lot, but topping the list of changes are the new phone system and class schedule.

Those students who call collect or bill it to a third number may dial 8-0-area code and the number. The operator will then ask for the necessary information and the call will be connected. Students cannot dial direct on these phones.

One of the biggest problems being solved with this new system is that students no longer have to go through the switchboard to make long distance calls. Students who have a STAN line can dial 8-1area code and the number. The operator will then ask for the necessary information and the call will be connected.

Parents and friends will also find the system much more efficient, as they can call directly into the dorm rooms. (All phone numbers have a 248 prefix added to the extension.) This means that they will not have to go through switchboard either, and there will be no operator breaking in at closing time.

The faculty and administration offices have also been provided with some "extras" These range from an automatic "call back" to the ability to have calls transferred to any of the other offices, also automatically. The class schedule has also been revised. Instead of the three and four day schedule in use through last Spring, classes will now operate on a two and three day schedule. This allows for twelve time slots during the day intead of the usual seven. Administrators are hoping this will help eliminate most of the conflicts that normally occur between classes in different departments.

Classes held on Monday, Wednesday and Friday will have starting times of 7:30 a.m., 8:45 a.m., 10:00 a.m., 12:00 p.m., 1:15 p.m., 2:30 p.m., and 3:45 p.m. Classes held on Tuesday and Thursday will have starting times of 7:30 a.m.,



New faculty announced

Stephen Farnsley will join the full-time faculty this fall as an assistant professor of music with a concentration in band and instrumental music. A physician's assistant, she comes to Trevecca from the campus Family Practice Clinic.

Morris Stocks has been named an assistant professor of business. He is a '77 Trevecca graduate, and a certified public accountant, and has been employed by the state of Tennessee and in private industry.

Craig Keen will join the faculty as an assistant professor of philosophy. Keen holds the bachelors and masters degree from Bethany Nazarene College; the M. Div. from Nazarene Theological Seminary; and holds candidacy status for the Ph.D. from Claremont Graduate School. Randy Carden, a 1978 Trevecca graduate, received his M.A. from Middle Tennessee State University. He will be an instructor in psychology. Susan Johnson-Miller will be director of Trevecca's new Kinderhaus and an instructor in education. A graduate of Olivet Nazarene College, Mrs. Miller has done graduate work at Wayne State University.

WNAZ survives the Summer

Trevecca's 500 watt FM radio station, WNAZ (89.1 FM) managed to keep within FCC regulated standards of minimum airtime this summer, thanks to the direction of Trevecca's Director of Broadcasting, David Deese. Under his management, three students received summer announcing scholarships, and put in long hours of work, not only on the air, but also working in the production department. Those students holding summer scholarship positions were: D.R. Henderson, Marsha Brockman and Dan Wilkinson.

The arrival of the Associated Press News Wire has also added to quality of WNAZ. Now the station reports hourly news updates, as well as sports information. All this, along with the remodeling done last spring, has given the station, not only a better look, but a better sound.

This year student announcers will be given a competency test, and new announcers-to-be will spend time in the new training lab, instead of learning on the air, as announcers have done in the past. David Deese hopes this will greatly improve the quality of the stations sound.

This year's scholarship staff is anticipating the coming year. They are: Ken Westenburger, Program Director, who succeeds Jeff Thompson; Gary Ragsdale, News Director, who replaces Theresa Prevatt; Mark Michaels, Sports Director, who is taking over for Howard Wilson; and a new position has been added. John "Zonk" Moyers is the new student engineer. D.R. Henderson, this year's morning scholarship announcer, will continue his early morning show, with his "Celebrity Guest Host Hour," every Wednesday morning. Anita Thompson, the new office secretary, replaces Becci Hamontree, and will be keeping all office business running smoothly. With the new improvements, WNAZ hopes to have a sound this year that, as one DJ put it, promises to "soften even the most critical listener."

Fall enrollment may set record

The official figures will not be released for several days yet, but early indications are that enrollment for the 1981 Fall Quarter may reach the 1,000 mark. According to the large number of Freshman and Transfer applications, and a pre-registration phone check by Residents Assistants, Trevecca's on-campus population, as well as the total enrollment, may be higher than it has been for some time. Howard Wall, Director of Admissions, stated that the increase might be due to the offorts made by the admissions office this past year. According to Wall, most of those who applied for admission were contacted personally by his office, which may have helped encourage more high school graduates to consider Tre-

vecca.

Wall also conceded that the economy might have had something to do with it. He feels that, even though sources of financial aid are not as plentious, many students may have been unable to find a fulltime job, and decided to try college instead. At any rate, most indications are that Trevecca may have set a record during registration. Both Bud Robinson and Wise Halls are being used, as is normal for this time of year. However, at least one house on Lester Avenue is being used to house students, and some guys are having to sleep in suite lobbies until room is found. It was not disclosed if those without regular rooms would be charged the full boarding price or not.

Organizations offer many opportunities

There are numerous clubs and organizations on campus of which students can join and participate in as an extracurricular activity. As a service to students, Trev-Echoes would like to list and give a brief explanation of the major ones. We hope this will help you find those in which you are interested. A list of presidents and other officers is available through the Student Services office.

TREV-ECHOES is the official newspaper of the Trevecca community. It provides many opportunities for students to participate in and learn about the field of journalism. Positions are still open in the areas of writing and ad sales. Those interested should contact the editor, come by the office or drop a note in Box 646.

DARDA is the school yearbook, and is another publication produced by the students. Students may work in ad sales, layout, photography and other areas involved in producing the annual. Becky Gillespie is the editor, and would welcome your talent.

WNAZ, owned and operated operated by the college, provides a unique opportunity for students to get involved in the area of broadcasting. The radio station trains, and has as its staff, students, who serve as disc jockeys and announcers, as well as various other positions in news and sports.

The **FORENSICS** team is more of an academic organization than a club. The Team travels to many tournaments throughout the year, participating in several speech and debate-type competitions. In recent years, the team has piled up numerous victories against large and wellknown universities, giving them the reputation as a powerhouse team on the circuit. They also host an annual tournament here on with helping others. The club stages and participates in many activities throughout the year which are primarily aimed at helping underprivileged girls. Two of the club's most popular events are a Fashion Show and Carnival, which are held annually.

CIVINETTES is another women's service club, giving ladies on campus a chance to be of service to other organizations and groups. Last year they held a book fair to benefit the Library, and helped raise money for World Vision, International. The Ladies also had the distinct honor of winning several awards at a regional convention, and being chosen as last year's "Club of the Year."

CIRCLE K is the only exclusively men's club on campus, and is very active. The club annually provides services to the boys at the Tennessee Preparatory School through personal contacts and campus events. One of the club's most well-known events is the annual Volleyball Marathon, which makes them one of the largest contributors to Multiple Sclerosis in the state of Tennessee.

The **TREVECCA MINIS-TERIAL ASSOCIATION** is open to all Religion majors. They provide opportunities for Christian service both on, and off, campus. Christian films, trips to Kansas City and annual Easter Egg Hunt are just a few of their activities. They also helped the Nashville Boy's Club last year by painting, tutoring, and sponsoring activities for the boys.

CHRISTIAN WORKERS IN ACTION is another Christian service club. It is open to all students, and provides chances for them to be witnesses in many situations. The club frequently provides services to the Trevecca Health Care Center and Spencer Youth Center.

The **HONOR SOCIETY** is open to students with at least a 3.5 Grade Point Average. They are constantly trying to improve the academic environment and provide activities to create interest in intellectual pursuits. Their biggest activity last year was the first annual Quiz Bowl.

The STUDENT TENNES-SEE EDUCATION ASSOC-IATION is composed of Trevecca's students preparing for the teaching profession. The group participates in activities aimed at helping these students gain more knowledge in the area of teaching.

The VETERANS CLUB is an organization of students with a common past, rather than a common goal: that of serving their country. The club provides fellowship and help to those students who have served in the military. They also help students of disabled parents gain financial aid.

There are also many musical the other clubs open to students. Most of these other organizations are geared to a specific department. Students can learn about these through the various departments.



World's Fair Update

Knoxville—The DuPont Company has announced its sponsorship of the DuPont Marching Band at The 1982 Worlds Fair, and in so doing, will become the "Official Musical Welcoming committee" for international visitors at the event, to be held here May I through October 31 next year.

Other plans announced by the Wilmington, Delawarebased company call for the band to lead crowds of visitors through Knoxville to open the World's Fair each day, and to be on hand as the official greeter for the national dignitaries, statesmen, and celebrities through the 184-day run of the event.

"Everybody loves a parade, and who can resist the sound of a marching band," said a DuPont spokesman. "The DuPont band will be a highly visible "moving" exhibit adding to the galaxy of creative energy, and live entertainment."

The theme of the 1982 World's Fair—first World's Fair in the United States since 1974—is "Energy Turns the World."

DuPont joins such other American corporate giants as U.S. Steel, Tenneco, Occidental Petroleum, Federal Express, Eastman Kodak, Ford Motor Company, Coca-Cola, General Electric and Delta Air Lines as World's Fair participants

In addition 12 exhibits representing 17 different nations are currently comitted, making the 1982 World's Fair in terms of international exhibit space, larger than expositions in Seattle, Spokane and San Antonio.

"The World's Fair's energy theme will be highlighted not only by impressive presentations on solar, wind, oil and geo-thermal energy but by exciting attractions such as the DuPont Marching Band, which we believe supports the energy theme in a unique and creative way," said George M. Siler, Executive Vice President of The 1982 World's Fair. Band uniforms will be specially designed by a famous name designer-to be selected at a later date-showcasing DuPont Textile Fibers, widely used for band uniforms at high schools and colleges across the country. The band will play for the World's Fair's expected 11 million visitors with an international flavor. In addition to Americana, Nashville and the contemporary sounds, specially arranged music to honor the participating nations will "fill the 70acre site of the World's Fair."

TIA cuts tackle football


For the first time in years, tackle football will not be a part of the Trevecca Intramural Association's fall lineup. Ed Darling, TIA Vice President, announced last week that he and Coach Alan Smith, Director of Intramural Activities, had decided to cancel tackle football and play flag football instead.


The reason for the switch, according to Darling, was that the helmets which the athletic department now owns, are not NOCSAE approved. To use these helmets would leave Trevecca open for serious insurance and liability problems.

According to Darling, this left Smith and himself with only two choices. They could either buy new, approved, helmets, or cut out tackle altogether. Because of budget restrictions, there was only enough money to buy thirty helmets. However, Darling felt that forty-five were needed, in order to provide a comfortable range in sizes. The only way they could afford the extra fifteen helmets would be to make the players pay an extra \$5.00. Darling felt that this was "too high a price to pay," jhust

"too high a price to pay," just to play football. Therefore, he made the decision to play flag, instead.

Although Darling realizes that this will be an unpopular decision, he also feels that it may encourage more people to participate in the football program. He is also hoping that the ladies' program will improve this year.
