


The faculty members returned to Trevecca with plans for the year and with a determination to make this a profitable one for the students.

Dr. A. B. Mackey Begins 17th Year As President

Dr. A. B. Mackey is beginning his seventeenth year as president of Trevecca Nazarene College. He came to Trevecca in 1925. He served as high school principal from 1926 to 1929, as dean of college from 1929 to 1936 and was elected president in 1936.

At that time Trevecca was at a financial crisis. Dr. Mackey believed in Trevecca during those days when our school almost went out of existence because of debt. He began to work immediately toward decreasing this debt and starting Trevecca on a progressive march.

During the first year of Dr. Mackey's administration the current debts were paid off, teachers received a regular salary and the expansion program began.

Five new buildings have been erected since he became president, the latest one being the new Fine Arts building. We are happy to see the new buildings going up and other advancements being made. We know that with Dr. Mackey as president continual progress will be seen.

LIBRARY SERVICES

The library at Trevecca offers a wide variety of materials to meet the needs of both students and faculty. Materials for supplemental or collateral reading, recreational reading as well as those at the professional level are available for all who need or desire them.

The card catalogue is a complete file of all books in the library arranged by author, title, or subject entry. It is for the convenience of the students and should be used constantly by them.

For locating articles in magazines the Reader's Guide to Periodical Literature is the best source. Those interested may find material listed under subject. Also indicated will be the name of the article, author, name, volume number, page number and date of the magazine in which the article will be found.

All reference materials such as encyclopedias, dictionaries, atlases, maps, biographical dictionaries, etc. As well as magazines, current and bound are found in the reading room of the library. These are to be used in the reading room and are not to be taken out.

Books may be checked out for a period of two weeks with renewal privileges of an additional two weeks.

On the reserve shelf is found a collection of books which circulate for a limited time only. These may be checked out for one hour, two hours, one day or one week as indicated by the instructor who places them on the reserve shelf. One hour and two hour books are used in the reading room only. It is important that all materials complete statistical records may be kept. Books should also be returned promptly on date stamped in the back of the book.

Materials, equipment, and machines are being provided to the end that this new phase of Trevecca's personal services may function efficiently from the beginning. It is believed that our Reading Improvement Services will be a great help to our students and be our aid to our entire scholastic program.

- * To help solve religious problems and aid youth in becoming established in Christian living.


COUNSELING SERVICE FOR 1953-54
