### Dr. Ludwig to Hold Spring Revival

The spring revival begins May 8 and continues through May 11. The special speaker will be Rev. S. T. Ludwig, D.D.

He has served as general church secretary of the Church of the Nazarene for the past ten years. Dr. Ludwig is well qualified for his diverse responsibilities as he has a substantial background as editor, educator, youth leader, and pastor.

Immediately prior to his present assignment, Dr. Ludwig was president of Bethany-Peniel College, Bethany, Oklahoma. Also at various times he has served as head of Bresse College, Hutchinson, Kansas, and teacher at Olivet Nazarene College, Kankekee, Illinois, and Northwest Nazarene College, Nampa, Idaho. At present he is part-time instructor at Nazarene Theological Seminary, Kansas City.

From 1936 to 1942 Dr. Ludwig was secretary of the national youth work of the Church of the Nazarene. In that capacity he was also editor of the *Young People's Journal*.

### Cafeteria Purchases New Equipment

It is a joy to see the progress which is being made on the new cafeteria building. Dr. Mackey and Mr. Cunningham, have already begun to supervise the buying of some equipment.

A stainless steel dish washing machine has been purchased which will be of great aid. A grilled top range has also been purchased. This will enable the workers to fry steaks and other food on the top of the range. One of the most useful purchases is a new serving tray which is entirely of stainless steel. There is a compartment to keep the food hot while serving. This is not done by steam as the former one was but is done automatically. There is another compartment for the salads, with built in refrigeration. There will also be some work tables of the latest model, a baker's table which has drawers to keep pans and everything necessary in baking in one place and all quite handy. Some new steel sinks will be in use and will be much more efficient than the ones now used.

Many improvements are now being made at Trevecca for which we are thankful and once more we can see the hand of God taking care of our needs.

He therefore began making plans, and immediately enrolled in Olivet Nazarene College.

After leaving Olivet College, Dr. Wells went to California where he pastored a church there for some years, and was also in the evangelistic work. He has been district superintendent of the Kentucky-West Virginia District and Ken-

**GLOBAL GLIMPSES**

As Senator Joseph McCarthy (R-Wis.) continues to expose those who are connected with communists, or those who even look like they might have been amiable to the party at one time, he is lambasted by the U. S. Army on charges of improper means in securing information, etc., from different sources. Recently the Army has listed twenty-nine charges on row with the senator and the chief counsel of his subcommittee, R. M. Cohn. There were various kinds of charges, but several of these were with particular reference to the extreme abusive language of the senator toward some of those with whom he had come in contact. Senator John Sherman Cooper of Kentucky, one of the few Republican senators who will challenge McCarthy on the floor, declared that the funds given to the various committees should be taken away when the committee abuses its cause. The Senate voted to give \$207,000 to McCarthy's subcommittee for its further procedures. Senator Cooper was one of those who voted in that way, but he now says his vote was a mistake and he insinuates that the McCarthy subcommittee is abusing itself. So much for McCarthy this time.

In appealing in a world-wide Easter message, Pope Pious XII requested that there be a ban on atomic and hydrogen bombs. He said that the nations should use them for self-defense only. He also urged the people of the world to turn to the Christian way of living as it is the only hope for peace. Since we are on the subject of religion, we want to especially recognize the great work Billy Graham is doing in England. The famed evangelist has been there now for several weeks and has been urging them to turn back to God and recognize religion as they did it in the days of Wesley.

In regard to the dire situation in Indochina, President Eisenhower assured Congress that U. S. troops will not be sent there to help without the matter being first brought to Congress. Red aggressors are bidding for Indochina, and are getting closer and closer to it, and doubtless something will have to be done soon.

Spruill, while giving up only 3 hits to the frosh, got the only hit for the sophomore club.



Dr. DuBois is well qualified for his work, having a substantial background of pastoral and youth work. During these pastorates he was active as a youth leader, serving four years as the district N. Y. P. S. president of the Northwest district. In this capacity he gave outstanding leadership to the development of the yearly summer institute sponsored by the district youth organization.

A native of South Dakota, Dr. DuBois has spent much of his life in the Northwest. He was educated there, receiving the bachelor's degree from Northwest Nazarene College, Nampa, Idaho, and the master's degree from the University of Idaho. In 1948 his alma mater conferred upon him the honorary Doctor of Divinity degree.

Dr. DuBois maintains his offices at the international headquarters in Kansas City, Missouri. However, much of his time is spent in extensive travel. He is in constant demand as a youth speaker.
