Dr. Rae was an engineer when called to full-time Christian service in the Church of the Nazarene. He completed training at the Nazarene college in Glasgow and also earned a master's degree at Glasgow University.

He served Nazarene churches as pastor at Dundee and Dunfermline, both in Scotland.

For the past several summers, he has been engaged in revival campaigns throughout the British Isles.

## C.W.A. REPORTS

The challenge to spread the gospel which the Christian world faces is an urgent one. Many there are who face life, and death, with no knowledge of One who can save to the uttermost. They have never been told of Jesus Christ who died for their sins, that they might have eternal life. Members of the Christian Workers Association have realized this and many have gone out faithfully week after week to take the gospel to those in need. They have gone with faith and courage believing that their message could transform the worst of sinners and make of them regenerated and sanctified Christians. They have not been disappointed. God has rewarded their efforts.

Since last June 4, 851 Christian workers have ministered to 24,188 people in the various services held every week-end. In order to give a complete picture for the entire year, it would be necessary to have the reports for another Sunday. However, to date approximately 3,144 people have raised their hands and requested the Christian workers to pray for them. Of this number 842 have been definitely converted and an additional 865 reported that they received definite spiritual help in the services.

As we look back over this year and see the wonderful way in which God has worked, and the many people who have been reached, we can do no other than bow our heads and hearts in thanksgiving to God.

Our heartiest thanks go to the fine follow-up secretary, Ida Vaughn, and visitation chairman, LeRoy Davis.

Through your C.W.A. some 19,812 souls have been reached this year. Of these, 2,476 raised their hands for prayer, 689 were definitely saved, and 736 received spiritual help.

Two hundred New Testaments and 35,700 tracts were distributed.
