
CONVERSATION CENTRAL

Two smaller white stripes represent peace and the red triangle stands for the struggle for independence. It also has symbols that represent vigilance, agriculture, and the importance of education.

Question: Do you know what a Cyclone is?


Answer: It is a large air mass that rotates around a strong center of low atmospheric pressure,

counterclockwise in the Northern Hemisphere and clockwise in the Southern

Hemisphere. Pretty Interesting!

If you have ever lived through a cyclone or even a tornado, you know that the outer edges of the storm are where it can be the most dangerous, but in the center it is calm. It might even make you think the storm is over. A cyclone is a good reminder of what our life is like without Jesus. God is our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in trouble.



KIDS KALEIDOSCOPE RECIPE



Pão

Mozambican Bread Rolls





INGREDIENTS

- 1kg 2.2lbs of flour
- 5.69grams 1tsp of salt
- 1 small sachet of dry yeast about 10g .35oz
- · Enough water to make a sticky dough

Utensils: large bowl, dishtowel, baking tray



PREPARATION

- 1. Mix all ingredients together in a large bowl until the dough is not so sticky (about 6 minutes).
- 2. Cover with a dishtowel and leave to rise for about an hour.
- 3. Take the dough out of the bowl, knead with oiled or floured hands (knead means to work and press the dough with your hands), cover and let rise a second time.
- 4.Pre-heat oven to about 220°C 425°F. You need a very hot oven.
- 5.Once dough has risen a second time, tip it out of the bowl onto a clean flat surface and start breaking off pieces, making them into fist-sized balls. Place them on a floured baking tray.
- 6. Have an adult help you slit each ball/roll across the top with a very sharp knife and sprinkle them with flour.
- 7.Once slightly risen again, place in hot oven for about 15 minutes. Once you can smell the bread, and it is golden brown have an adult help you take it out of the oven and let cool on the baking tray. Enjoy your Pão

DID YOU KNOW?

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Pão is simply 'bread' in Portuguese which is the main language spoken in Mozambique.

Bread is a very important part of our Christian life. We remember Jesus dying on the cross when we take communion and we break bread, which represents His body. We pray Lord give us this day our daily bread, which comes from reading the Bible, His Word. As you make this simple bread and share it with family and friends remember all that Jesus has done for you and how He was present in a time of need for our friends in Mozambique. Jesus is the bread of life, just like we share bread, lets not forget to share Jesus, even in the hard times!
