Neither could grim privon walls. cruel beatings. or threats of death cool their passion to be faithful to His command.

The sight of those wound gave new assurance that the Christ who was alive forevermore would fulfill the promise. - Lo. I am with you alway, even unto the end."

Holiness manifests itself in honor, justice, and honesty. Holiness is God's standard for human conduct. "W'e should have nothing in our charater or conduct un worthy of the One we represent." Holiness of hear is a necessary qualification for man to see God Holiness and happiness are as inseparable as misery and sin
The seraphim in heaven cry, "Holy, holv, hols. is the Lord of hosts: the whole earth is full of his glory" (Isaiah 6:3). These angels with six wings are the flaming ones who burn in love in the pres ence of the holines of Gool. The ate whenels
happy being near God. Our happiness in heaven or on earth will be due to our being holy and being with God. When man partakes of God's holiness he enjoys the matire of Deity. He leels set apart, deansed, sacred, hallowed, and sanctified. God cleanses the heart from the inborn nature of sin.

Holiness in man makes it easy to make a complete, everlasting commitment or dedication to God's will. This giving of one's all is deep and abiding. It gives the participant an unfaltering faith, a rest of faith, a full assurance of faith. The heart is tilled to overflowing with love. It is the moral perfection of the soul. Holiness means death to the self-life. It is an overcoming, victorious power, a living and walking with God. It is a pure heart rejoicing in God our Saviour.

ONE WAY the business world has of determining how successful it has been in selling certain items is to take inventory. By using this method, the businessman can decide how much of a certain product he has sold and how murh of it is still on hand. By this process the merchant an determine what products have been selling well and which have not, and on this basis decide which products to purd hase again, which ones wreplace, and which ones to omit all together.

In the spiritual realm it is good that we take spiritual inventory at times. God's Word tells us: "Examine vourselves, whether ye be in the faith: prove your own selves" (II Corinthians 13:5) . And we do need 10 examine ourselves in the light of Cod's holy llord to see how well we are doing in living acooding to God's will for our lises. Mans who do not do this lime themselves either in the legalism of the seribes and Pharisees. or in the dactessness of math of todat's wheh member drip. Ihey drite atong umooncemed about theis spiritual status. At times we do need to take spiritual inventory.

However, in the lives of people who want with all their hearts and souls to follow Christ, there is a danger that the pendulum may swing to the puraite extreme. There is a tendency to take ypituat insentons so moch that takinge spiatual
inventory is all that is ever accomplished. There is a danger that a person becomes so introspective that he has no time left to consider: How are others doing? What about my fellow Christian who needs a lift: What about the sin in the world, and how an I help combat it? How can I win my neighbor who is lost in sin, and headed for cernity without God:

It is possible for us to forget some of the other "weightier matters of the law" (Mathew 23:23), We coukd forget the basic principle that one way to be spiritually surcesfal is to give ourselses in weking to help strengthen our lellow Christians and to help win others to Christ.

Moses. Paul, and other great men in the bible were those who expended themselves for Christ, and not those who sat around taking spiritual inventory. One thing that is necessary in having a good spiritual life is 10 give one's self to Christ ia service to His catuse. Jesus said, "He that findeth his life bhatl lose it: and he that loseth his lile for m! sake shall find it" (Mathew 10:39). We abo admonished us to "go out into the highwas and hedges and compel them to come in" (Luke 11:93). Spiritual stuccess is not found so much by looking inward as it is in actively serving Christ.

To reiterate, we mas take spiritual inventory at times with God's leadership and in the light of His scarching Word-to evaluate our relationship to our Lord and Saviour. Otherwise we may find ourselves with spiritual anemia. But let us go beyond this type of life, into a life of service 1o Christ and concern for others. For spiritual insemory an be dangerous if it does not deepen our sense of obligation to other and the whole wh the work of Corlis hingdom.

SOME TWO YEARS AGO the distribution of camberries wa prohibited immediately when it was leaned that a spray used in their growing "might be a contributing factor in cancer."

Today tobacco is known to be a major cause of cancer as well as heart disease. This "twentypoisoned weed" robs men of many golden years of their lives. It offers its patrons a program of "suicide on the installment plan." Has the Church of Jesus Christ any responsibility to speak out against "King Nicotine"? The Church of the Nazarene answers in the affirmative!

Nazarencs are not alone in this mater of waming the membership. The Methodist Disripline upeahs clearly as follows:
"In the interest of a larger Christian influfore and senvice we urge our people to abstain from the use of tobacco in all its torms. . . We remind our membership that the principle of right example must be considered in regard to the use of tobacco."
Before me lies the most pungent treatment of the subject I have ever read. It is the work and study of a prominent Baptist. He does not hesitate
to state that he is consinced the use of this poison is a sin! Further, no open-minded person would dispute the claim that that which injures a minister's influence will abo hinder the testimony of a layman.

The "Nazarene" is the example of the people called Nazarenes. We ark ourselves, "What would Jesus do:" The Scripures sity, "For even hereunto were se called: because Christ also suffered for us. leaving us an example, that ye should follow in his steps" (I Peter 2:21). It is quite prepostcrous to feature Jesus as enslaved by the tobaco habit while talking of Ireedom in the Spirit! It is wrong to do amsthing that would be inconsistent for Jesus to do.

The bodies of the saved belong to Christ. Consecrated bodies are to be used only in ways that please the Sanctificr. The conscientious Christian cannot do things he knows to be harmful to "the temple of God" (I Cormhians 3:16-17). In I Corinthians $6: 20$ we are instructed io "glorify God in your bods, and . . which are Gods." Modern scientific warnings testify that the weed of twents poisons stunts the mind, affects digestion, renders mothers unable to mure their voung, and hinders the athlete.

The writer knows that it would be terribly wrong for his welve-gearohd daughter to use tobacco. But if he used it, his example would tead her that there is no harm in it. If it is all right for me, it is all right for my wife to use it. There is nothing in the Bible to justify a dual standard of conduct in any area of life.

One way to recognize sin is by its effects in the enslatement of the will. which God purposes to remain free and soverign. The Bible says, "Let not sin therefore reign in your mortal body, that ve should obey it in the lusts thereof" (Romans 6:12). We ate to bring our bodies into subjection and 10 ot permit habis to become fastened on us until we become poor. helpless, enslaved victims fancing ourselves free! Our bodies are to be brought into subjection.

The Bible does not memion tobacco. It did not grow in Bible lands in Bible times. White men discovered it among the American Indians. Though the Bible, therefore, states no specific hatw against the weed, it does speak of principles of purity, deanness and liberty. Panl sass in I Corinthians b: I2, "All things are lawful for me, but I will not be brought under the power of any."
lt is the consensus among the most spiritual and useful Christians that the une of tobaco by Christians is incerosable Protessing Christians who use it would be far more effective were they to overome the habit. The religious world offers no prominent or effetive soul winner who uses tobacco. The Christian conscience of today speaks out loudly against it. Mams addicts today admit to a troubled conscience.

The hathit in conls. The writer has seen people who had to bormow money to place food on the table-but ther still smoked! They lind money for tobaceo when they have money for mothing else. If men mus gite acoum to god for evers idle word, then whels the mont give an account for such mixpent and wasted dollars!

IN RECENT YEARS various religions organizations have attemped to chablish a particular pub)lic image in the ededion of the $i$ chard name. The word "open" appear frequently now in such titles as "Chureh of the Open Down." "Church of the Open Bible." etc. To this lise might be added the "Church of the "pen Mind" for thone congregations so liberal thes stand for nothing, or the "Church of the Open Palm" for groups whose primary concem is material expansion.
The true body of belicters, gencrously manifesting the imerworkings of love between the brethren, might be called the "Churd of the Open Heart."
The world has never sood in greater need of this latter group, than it does todas. The shifting of masses of population and the intermingling of people of tarving social positions have placed new tests on the Christian's apacity to lose his fellow man. Thus the "Church of the Open Heart" has become as much an imperative today as it was in that first century when Hebrew and gentile were thrown together in their places of worship.
The "Church of the Open Heart" has no special pew for the man "wearing goodly apparel," nor does it place a premium on the head of failure. It has no peephole called prejudice through which it studies the stranger on the threshold while deciding how wide 10 open the door.
With confidence that it is the stagnant pool, not the bubbling spring. which is contaminated as the unclean soop up handfuls of water to drink, the Church invites all. even the vilest of simers, to come and partake of the waters of life.
Wie do not, however, become a haven for the

lonely simply by advertising ourselves as the "Churh with a Weloome." More is required than a church sign. a slogan posted on our bulletin board, or a moto printed in our weekly paper. In fact a dhurch need not talk much about its friendlinow: for lowe like the churd lumace, is either working or it is not, and the vistor quickly senses the difference.

We maty boast that our doors are open to all, forgetting perhaps that even traps have open doors. It matters little that people can come uninvited into our sanctuary if they can never get into our circle. In the "Church of the Open Heart" the individual is more than a digit on the statistical soreboard in the race with last year's record or this year's goal.

The early Christian Church exemplified the allcmbracing arm of Christian charity. There was, for example, a disciple called Ananias living in Damasus. Word had come to him that the believers in that city had become the latest target of a zealous Pharisce, Saul of Tarsus. He who had overseen the martyrdom of Stephen now approached this distant outpost of the Christian faith with orders to bind the believers and return them to Jerusalem.

In such a setting we witness Christian love in action. Ananias is making his way across Damascus and is now knocking at the door of one Judas on the street called straight. At the sight of him who just last week breathed out "threatenings and slaughter against the disciples of the Lord," Ananias, in an outpouring of Christian love, uttered the two simple words, "Brother Saul."

If the Christian must love his enemies, then sured he mus not be antempuons of his friends. God. who is willing to make all men sons, is grieved when we refuse to make some men brothers.

Until our Lord returns, the world needs and God demands the "Church of the Open Heart."

 what we might call a "romary of tathful sat ings." Some think that these veres ane pant of an ancient hym. It could wers well be true. for the theme is worthy of a homn, and a grand one at that. In these verses the $\mathrm{I}_{\mathrm{p}}$ ostle tells us in substanct:
If we die to sin through Christ, we will live forever with Him in a heaven of perfect holiness. It we dic a death of mantrdom, a marter's crown awais us. If we patiemly bear our cros below, we shall have a cown of joy, glory, and immortalis. above. If we dens His chams, Hin cross, His gooped. He will dene us on that lan great das.
To this he adds, "It we believe not. set he abid eth faithful." Let me emphasize the last three words, He whideth taithful.
"He abideth taithlul" - He remains faithful always in all circumstances.

## The Transforming Power of the Gospel

The name of Chates Darwin has become ahost synonymous with the theory of evolation in our modern world. But there is a little known episode in the life of Darwin-who incidentally was a minister's son-that illustates the marvelous power of the gospel of Christ.
$\mathrm{O}_{i 1}$ a visit to South America, Darwin found a tribe of people who were but litale better than anim: ls. Their minds were undeveloped and childlike. their bodies were ravaged by disease, and they lived in lilth and degradaton. According to Darwin's riews, it would take thousands and thousands of years to bring these people to the ordinary level of civilized life.

SOME IEARS L.AIER, Damin made another visit to these people who had interested him so much. He could sarcely believe his cyes. The matives now wore clothing. They could read and write. They harl schools and churches. In every way they gave evidence of a tremendous cultural clevation. Inguiring as to the reasons behind this umbelievable mirade, the scientist was tok simply: "Missionaries have come." Once more the gospel had proved itself the miracle power of God to change and thansform.

Here is a power that works in society because it grips the heart and meets the need of the indisidual. Over and over, humanitarians have at. tempted to transform human life by altering the environment. It has been assumed that men are naturally good, and if their surroundings are favorable, it has been argued that they will develop good moral character.

OVER AND OVER, the effort has failed. The finest housing developments quickly become slums if the will to improve is lacking. The irreducible fact is that evil in this universe did not begin in hell, but in a rebellion of an archangel in heaven. Sint on earth did not start in at slum, but in the beautiful Garden of Eden. While not denying the importance and influence of environment, it still must be sad that man makes his own enviromment for more often than the enviromment makes the man.

For a work in the shape of ours, the only real hope is the liberating, elevating power of the gospel of Jesus Christ. If world missions were ever op-
tional for the Church, they are not now. Our very sumval depends upon an alloou clfort to preach the sating gopel to all men evervohere.

It follows. with apologies for the personal reference:
"Dr:ar Dr. Porkisfar:
"Just the other day I read your editorial in the Mareh ly Herald of Holiness about " "Acts" and Prater.' It seems like thes gel better all the time.
"I certainly do appreciate your writing. These have been some difficult days, but God has helped ws again and again.

- I read a story about a couple who were trapped on the beach in a horseshoc cove by the incoming tide. The only possible esape was the steep cliff behind them. Is she looked at the dizoy heights she begged him to go on without her. But he put his hands on her shoulders and looked into her eyes and said, 'We must climb or drown.' The water was already washing around their feet and they did climb and were saved. Later when they were married, dark tragedy stalked into their lives. But again he put his hands on her shoulders and said, We will have to go higher, like we did that time by the sca.'
"Our lises have been like that. Time and again we have had to dimb higher and find higher ground. but Gox helps us to do it. Your wonderful articles help us to climb. Keep on writing.
"Blessings on thee and thine.
"B. V. SFuts."

Indeed, the life of Buford V. Seals was one of "climbing higher." I Ic has made his last climb, and has now been borne into the heights by the hands
of the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who is too wise to make a mistake, and too good to
be makind. He leaven to us all his footsteps to follow.

## DR. B. V. SEALS

DR. B. V. SEMLS was bom lebmant 14. 1898, at Kempher. Tじas. Io a catle and cotton ratncher.

When he was eighteen reats old, a gith wangelint front llamlin. I ©as, Holiness College cathe to his section of the combtr holditig summer or bitals, and won him to the lowd. with scores of others. Iwo summers later. another campaign, also conducted by her, saw him sanctified. And later, on dugust 18. 1918. he married the chaming evangelist.

To this union, five children were born: Buford Scals, of Portland. Oregon; Catherine Moote of Seattle; Chrostel! Wordsworth of seattle: and Paul and Ralph. decoased.

Dr. Seals's serice in the Church of the Nazarene has been long and fruitful. His first pastorate at Holtsille, Califomia, was followed by pastotates at Escondido. (alifomia, and Des Moines. Iowa. In 1931 he was elected district superintendent of the old Cental Nomth. west District. which included Minnesota and South Dakota, and sewed seven years. In 1938 he moved to the pastorate at seattle Central Church, and in 1914 he was elected to the superintendency of the newly formed Washington Pacific District I'nder his leadership it a grown from 2.0.s to 5,166 church nembers. and from 35 to $6 t$ churches.
Dr. Seals taveled evemsisely on the Forth Imerican continemt and twice to Europe in exangelistic work. He was on the Oliset Board of Regents. also on the Northwest Nazarene College Board since 1931, sewing fifteen of these vars as chaiman. In 1919 the college honored him by conferring upon him the doctor of disinity degree. Three quadrennia he has served on the General Board. and two quadrennia on the Sazarene Sominary Board.

He has written two books, Beside the Shepherd's Tent and Stars and Scars. which is just off the press and reflects the rich background of his life.
Dr. Seals was converted in a Nazarene revical-he is a product of the church. He was not a man of formal religious training, wet his constant reading kept his message fresh and effective. He was genuive. He lived deeply. He knew how 0 analve problems so that their whution seemed so natural. He was a most congenial and pleasant conversationalist. With a tich mixtute of refreshing humor.
He loied life. A few moments in his presence was proof of that. He lored nature, and often took hunting and

fishing trips to be near it. He loied his frieuds. and spent hours with them, great and small. He lowed his family. They were ever first in his thoughts and concern. Todar he is with Ralph. Paml. Varjorice and Farl. Du ahwaw sote of his wife. children, and sand. childuen with glistening eves.

Fxperience is the tem which mast Gam the geat propotion of the weight in edat's lesson. The time element is important-there is a second work of the grace of God following initial con besion and comparable to it in sig. nificance. But the wotk of grace is primars. for it must be achowledged that some great saints of the past have enjoned the "fallases of the spitit" without consciously entertaining the concept of two distinct works of grace.

Ihere are three foundations which support the claim to this second crisis experience. Histors, stating with the Xew 「estament records occasions when people were sanctified after accepting Christ as Sasiour, and subsequent evidence substantiates the claim. Then there is the theology of sanctification. stating with the allusions and suggesfions and exhortations given in the New lestament and eventuating in its sys. Iematic presentation Lastls, there is porhologs. The med of one's heant and life is the strongest angument for the doctrine of second-blessing holiness.

The soripture readings for todas all imply that the people involved were aheady in a conscious saving relationship with Christ. They were either told of another specific experience. exhorted (1) recoive it, or the were described as hating received it.

The success of the message of secomd bessing holiness may well be defer mined by the manner of its presentation. The three words in the lesson title serve to illustrate this: second, crisis, experience. They demote three ele-
ments of the dectine: the time clement. the mamer of impact and the experiala itsolf. Xo one should knowingly dent that the experience is all-important, and that here is where the emphasis should be haid. Few will be constataned to become sechers except on the basis of a conscions inner urge and fath in the spitit's wonder-working power. let us place the emphasis where it belongs. on the work of the spitit in deansing the heat and cm . procting the life
