It will be a tragedy to let it fail.

Registration Day was September 25, 1928. So great was the throng that desired to register that it was necessary to turn a great number away and devote a second day to registration. The increase over the previous year for the same day was 71 per cent.

The dormitories are full. The Dining Hall shows an increase of about 100 per cent in patrons over last year. The Chapel is simply crowded to the utmost.

The problem facing us is, just how to arrange the Chapel so that every student may have a seat. The enrollment has exceeded our fondest anticipations.

What does all this mean? It means just this -- God does not want Northwest Nazarene College to close but rather He is trying to show us that the future hold tremenduous things for us if we will arise and wipe out this monster of debt.

A little less than \$12,000.00 more in cash will wipe out \$85,000.00 of debt. Let us finish the job.

spoke briefly on the history of Northwest Nazarene College revealing the fact that 104 had graduated from the College of Liberal Arts of whom 47 per cent were engaged in Christian work and 34 per cent in educational work. At the conclusion of his address a census was taken which showed that 21 states, the District of Columbia, Alaska, South Africa, and four Canadian provinces were represented in the studentbody. Also it revealed that 12 different denominations were represented. Therefore Northwest Nazarene College draws from Texas and Oklahoma to Alaska and South Africa west. Also although the school is denominational it is not sectarian. The remaining part of the program included musical numbers, readings, and games. The evening closed with refreshments.

For eleven years now we have watched the incoming of students at the fall openings. There have been times when the enrollment has increased in numbers and times when it has decreased. Like all other things in life it has fluctuated, and accordingly it has always been with some trepidation that we have waited each time for registration day to come.

Always before in the college department we have been able to enroll all who were on hand the first day, and moreover also often had time to spare, but this time we had to turn a great number of students away from the doors when five o'clock came and give another day to registration.
