I received a beautiful letter from Harold written the Saturday before the tragedy. Our great consolation is that we have a written statement from Harold that he was ready to go. How thankful we are that such was the case. His How thank-

letter in part is as follows;

"This finds me in Sayre, Oklahoma singing for a meeting. I stayed in Buhl for several weeks after school was out working in a tailor shop. I wasn't making any money to speak of so when the call came for me to help in a few meetings, I told the Lord that if He wanted me to go He would prove it by sending a way for me to get down there. The very next day Otho Schwab stopped and wanted me to go to Oklahoma City. Of course I thought that was the answer to my prayer.

"We have been here seven days and already had some good results. But we

are trusting God for greater things.
"I am trusting the Lord for His rection and keeping power. He has never failed me. Praise His name. The only thing I'm sorry about is that I have failed Him. I hope and pray from now on to be found in the center of His will. "I shall never forget what the school has meant to me."

As I write these lines tears are flooding my eyes. What a seeming tragedy. What faculty member or student will not feel deeply this loss? Beneath our sorrow we rejoice for the above lines. What a glowing testimony Harold has left us. He has kept the covenant of the Last Chapel Service. He will meet us "just inside the Eastern Gate."
