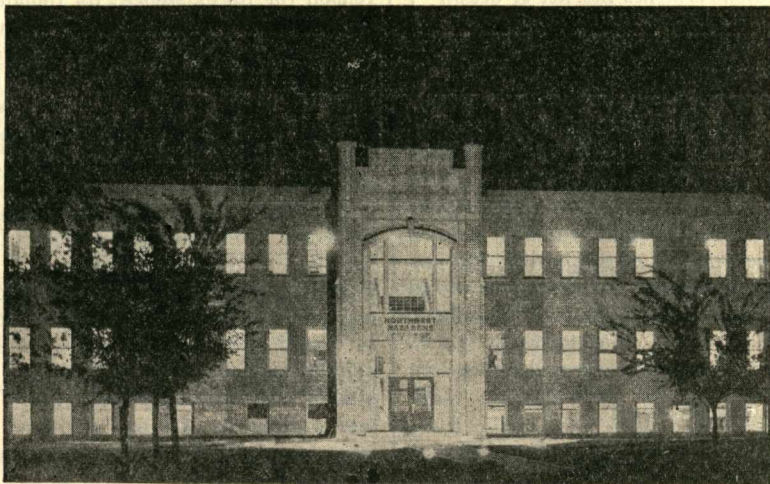

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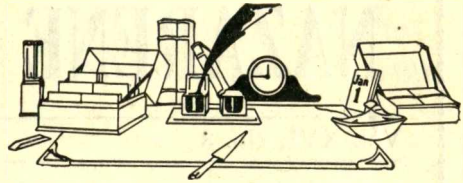

- 50 per cent of the Secretaries of the Treasury.



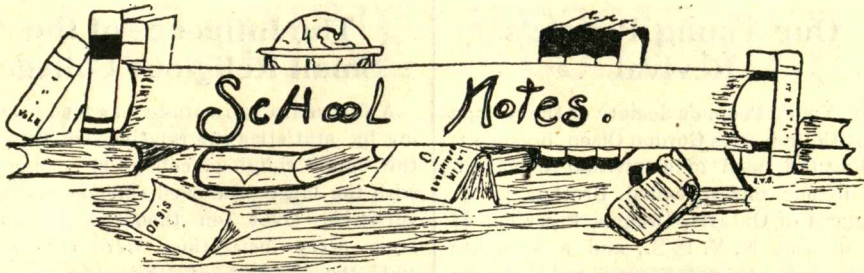
EDITORIAL

The Influence of the Small Religious College

A few years ago a study was made showing by statistics the relative benefits of the small religious college as compared with the larger endowed colleges and universities. Over ten thousand graduates from sixty institutions were considered and the results of this investigation brought to light the fact that the smaller colleges showed a larger percentage of successful men among their graduates than the more favored larger institutions.

The investigation showed also, that not only the largest number of successful men came from the smaller colleges, but that the percentage of success was sometimes twice as great as that in the larger schools.

A further and very significant result also was the fact that both as to the total number of successful men, and in the percentage of success, the preeminent place was held by the small church college.
