ampus involvement hinges on Senate

For the majority of the students on campus, the truth behind what the members of that group on campus known as the SGA actually do is a complete and total mystery. However, what the members of the Student Government Association are out to accomplish is great and beneficial. While it is true that you do see a number of students floating around campus wearing matching red shirts that bear the SGA emblem, there is much more to what they do than buy coordinating wardrobes. One of the most active branches in the student government is that of the legislative branch, the Senate.

For example, the Senate is in search of better ways to serve the campus by representing the student body and protecting the rights and ideas of the students. In order to do so, the Senate is made up of twelve members of the student body, three from each class. It is chaired by Executive Vice President, Bob Van Allen. Within the Senate are three committees: the Ways and Means Committee, the Student Life Committee and the Judiciary Committee.

The Senate then works together within the separate committees and considers all recommendations that are presented by the Executive Council. They make decisions as to whether or not they should enact the legislation presented.

As well as approving new legislature, the Senate proposes an outline of the budget for the Administration on how the student fees will be put to use. They approve clubs and organizations on campus who seek to use student fee money, and, among other things, they have the power to recall elected officers and fill vacant positions.

This term, the Senate has been up to exactly what it describes itself as doing. Along with appointing new class council officers for commuter students (Christi Tiel and Eli Effinger), hearing reports from all the club representatives, and, yes, approving new sweatshirts for the Senate, the Senate has been busy

working to fulfill the needs of the NNU student body.

Some of the current issues in the work are efforts to purchase a drum set to be used for events such as chapel and Time Out, rather than forcing those who play to drag their own sets from one end of campus to the other. In a strong effort to make this idea a feasible one, Michael Young has presented research and information as to the cost of a drum set and has even discovered a good deal on a decent set that might be accessible to the Senate if a purchase is in order.

Chaplain Gene Schandorff has generously offered to pay for half of the cost, and now a set of cymbals is inconsideration. The issue of storage of the drum set

has arisen. However, no decision will be made on the issue until the next meeting of the Senate when a vote can be taken.

As for other tasks of the Senate, one of the additional issues currently under consideration is the distribution of a sum of grant money. There was discussion regarding the process to determine

which clubs would receive the \$250 of grants. Four clubs applied for the grant: the Psychology Club, SIFE, the Business Club, and the Fencing Club, and the grants were given to the Psychology Club and the Fencing Club. However, several Senators expressed a desire to be a part of the selection process, and it was decided that the Ways and Means committee will present an explanation at the next meeting of the Senate, after which an additional vote will be taken.

Thus, the Senate keeps a busy schedule, all in the best interests of the student body, and another step is taken in an effort to meet the needs of the campus.

VENTURA, CA - Skate Street: A warehouse plywood-paradise of ramps and curves for young skateboard and in-line skaters. Sweat and blood. Crash and burn. Philippians and Colossians? Here the Rev. Ryan Delameter holds worship every Tuesday night.

At Skate Street Park, teens ranging in ages from 12 to18 skate free of charge, whereas normal rates for 3 hours are \$12. In return for admission, only one condition is set: the young skaters must sit quietly through a 15 minute devotional.

Delameter, Assembly of God minister, calls the program "Board for the Lord". Founded only seven months ago, the outreach ministry to the Southern California town near Los Angeles has almost tripled in size. With 120 teens in regular attendance, some youth feel "Board for the Lord" is making a difference in their lives.

"It's the right message at the right price," says 16 year-old Tyler Batten. "It's in our setting and we

learn about God."

While not all feel so positively, most agree that it's a small price to pay for an evening of skating. Morgan Bier, who adds with teenage pride that his last name means "beer" in German, comments, "It keeps kids off the streets and keeps people from yelling at us."

Rev. Ryan Delameter is not alone in his witness to the youth of Skate Street. Christian bands volunteer to come play while the teens are skating and help out with the lesson for the night.

Recently, Ryan Latham, a 21 year-old friend of Rev. Delameter, spoke to the group with an antidrug message. As a former drug addict, Latham shared past experiences with the teens, with many relating personally to his account of drinking, crime and violence.

"I kinda lost hope," Latham recalled. "My friends suggested that I read the Bible. I didn't believe in God. They challenged me and I said it was bogus. I started reading. The more I read, the less I could prove it wrong."

As he grabbed his board, he

urged anyone who wanted to talk to catch up with him on the ramps. Latham is also an Assembly of God minister, working exclusively with youth.

As the Bible lessons end in prayer, some of the 120 teenagers sitting on skateboards take off their scuff-marked helmets and bow their heads. Although not worship in the traditional aspect, it is powerful worship in the spiritual aspect. Jesus himself said that where two or more are gathered there He would be also.

To many, "Board for the Lord" is the only exposure to the gospel they've known, and many are eager to hear the Good News.

For Pastor Ryan Delameter, the fun goes on as he continues to do two of the things he loves the most: skating with the kids and witnessing for the Lord. Both keep him healthy, energetic and on top of the game.

We've been building friendships with these guys," Delameter says. "It's great letting the kids learn about God on their own level...Check this out. This is so awesome!"

Members of the congregation overpowered the man before the police arrived.

"I understand the priest was half way through Mass when the naked man came running in at the back of the church," said the Rev. Father William Agley, one of the priests in the parish. "He was shouting and brandishing a weapon which people described as a sword."

One of those injured underwent surgery, while two others were expected to undergo surgery. The three other stab victims received less serious injuries. The minor injuries included a broken leg and a sprained ankle.

Father Agley said the attacker was unknown to the priests in the parish, and members of the congregation said they had never seen him before.

"We really have no idea where he came from," Father Agley told reporters.

Basque truce comes to an end

MADRID, SPAIN - The armed Basque separatist group ETA announced Sunday, November 28, the end to a 13-month truce.

ETA made the announcement in Sunday's edition of the Basque newspaper Gara. ETA also said that, with the end of the truce, it was now up to the group's armed commandos to decide what actions they would take.

The group, blamed for nearly 800 deaths from bombings and shootings carried out since 1968, called an indefinite cease-fire September 16, 1998.

The cease-fire ushered in a peace process that halted after an initial round of talks in May between the Spanish government and representatives of ETA failed to open the way for further dialogue.

ETA demanded that the negotiations include discussion of its demand for an independent Basque homeland centered in northern Spain and southern France.

The government of Prime Minister José Maria Aznar has ruled out any change in existing national boundaries and insisted that any negotiations be limited to the logistics of the group's demobilization and the fate of its prisoners.

ETA's name is a Basque language acronym meaning Basque Homeland and Freedom.

Train collides with taxi, killing six

COMPTON, CA - Six people died Saturday night, November 27, when a taxicab collided with a commuter train south of Los Angeles.

The cab went through a red flashing warning signal and around a crossing gate and was hit by the Metropolitan Transportation Authority Blue Line Train, says Compton Police Department Lieutenant Danny Sneed.

The cab broke in half and caught fire, Sneed said. All six people in the cab, four men and two women, died at the scene.

The train's conductor was the only one on board. She said she saw the taxi alongside her southbound train when the cab suddenly made a left turn in front of her, trying to beat the train across the tracks. She tried to stop but couldn't slow the train in time to avoid hitting the taxi.

According to Sneed, the conductor was shaken but didn't appear to be injured. She was taken to a local hospital for observation.

The accident occurred just after 11 pm along the Metrolink Blue Line, is a 22-mile route between downtown Los Angeles and Long Beach

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Peace comes to North Ireland after thirty years

After 30 long and tangled years of dispute, the internal strife of Northern Ireland may finally be put to rest. However, some tricky issues have yet to be settled, namely that of IRA disarmament, before any kind of political stability can be claimed.

Having been in Northern Ireland just this last summer, I have seen first-hand the effects of a few extreme individuals on the general population, the building-high murals depicting men in black masks, the Red Hand of Ulster and other warnings that Britain wishes to reclaim N. Ireland for its own. Now the troubles may finally be solved.

Pro-British and pro-Irish parties have finalized arrangements for a coalition government which will become fully operational Thursday, when Britain gives Northern Ireland its first taste of home rule in 25 years. They will nominate ministers to the board which is to serve this government on Monday the 28th.

Hopes are high on both sides, prompted by the approval of the British Ulster party, who seek reunification with the mainland, to

Catholic-Irish government for the province.

The August 17, 1998 bombing of Omagh in North Ireland is just one of many incidences over the past 30 years that the people hope will come to an end with the movement towards peace

David Trimble, the leader of the party, will take charge of the new government, which itself was created jointly with Separationist party Sinn Fein. But while Trimble seeks closer links to London due to an independent local Parliament, Sinn Fein cherishes hopes of uniting the country through the new all-Ireland Ministerial Council.

However, the entire peace hinges on a critical issue, the dis-

form a joint Protestant-British and armament of the militant IRA party. Trimble has already stated that he refuses to head the new

> government unless the IRA voluntarily surrenders its weapons, and he has already written a post-dated letter of resignation which will be effected shortly unless some progress towards "decommissioning" has taken place. Evok-

ing mild surprise, the IRA expressed some willingness to disarm ten days ago, making a dramatic change in tactics. The IRA has agreed to appoint a go-between to work with disarmament authorities after the new governing council has been set in place.

Confidence is high that the hoped-for decommissioning will take place. However, some members of the Sinn Fein are less than pleased about the tactics of the

Ulster Unionists.

They claim that the other party has set deadlines without consulting them and that they have gone beyond the formulas to which they agreed when U.S. Senator George Mitchell chaired the peace talks.

To the Sinn Fein's chief negotiator the threat of resignation by Trimble seems to be planning for failure instead of the success which is needed for peace.

Martin McGuinness claims that disarmament must be a joint effort and that "[i]t is incumbent upon all of us now to put up the institutions, to make politics work and for politicians ... to create the conditions and the circumstances which will

see armed groups voluntarily destroy their weapons."



Over the last couple of weeks I have been thinking about faith. Our world is swarming with people who firmly believe that there is a God. This persistent belief in God is so strong in some people that they would be willing to die for it, or, in some cases, to kill for it.

According to the American Heritage College Dictionary, faith is a "belief that does not rest on logical proof or material evidence." After paying for the car, he is directed to the lot where he can pick it up. To his horror, the car he bought is a burned-up piece of junk which will never run again. In a case like this, most of us would be inclined to say that this

person deserves what he got. Who on earth would buy a car before having seen it or investigating it? So, while we won't buy a

car before proving that it is worth buying, we will most certainly believe in a religion before we know it to be true. To make things worse, we will even try to make others believe in the same unfounded things we do.

Two more things I would like to point out are that Pascal's wager is impractical and that one should neither be atheist nor theist.

true, I do hope that some of them are. For instance, I hope that Jesus was what he claimed to be. Hoping for something instead of having faith in it has its benefits. When you hope for something to be true, there is still a lot of room for uncertainty. Placing faith in something restricts what you believe, but hoping for something to be true allows you to be open to other possibilities.

Perhaps the best thing about hope is that it does not impress on people the need to make others hold the same hopes as you do. It is not possible for both a Jewish person and a Christian to be right in all of their beliefs. This tends to create a tension between the religions, and the result is evangelism. If people were to use

alternative: hope. While I do not hope instead of faith, no such tension would exist between different religions. It is entirely possible for one person to hope that Jesus is God and for another person to hope that Allah is God because these are personal choices.

By saying that you have faith in a particular god, you are stating a possible truth which usually denies the existence of other truths. On the other hand, if you say that you hope that a particular god is the right one, then you are merely stating your opinion, and, as we learned in grade school, opinions cannot be right or wrong; they are just personal preferences for certain things.

To sum all of this up, faith promotes the idea that one person is right and that people who believe differently are wrong. This kind of thinking often leads to the persecution of those who think differently from us, especially when those people make up a minority of our society.

In contrast to faith, hope enables people to choose ideas and religions which they like while remaining open to other possibilities. So, while I do not believe in God, it sure would be nice if Jesus was the real thing, and so I am going to cross my fingers and hope He will be waiting for me when I die, but if He isn't, then I'll have to settle with whatever I find.

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





Crusader men sweep Homecoming; now 4-0

The NNU men's basketball team has started the season right. Coming off the worst season in recent memory, the team is looking much different this year behind new starters Jeff Nielson and James Thomas. The team looks to continue building on the success they began last weekend as they played host to Trevecca Nazarene on Friday night.

NNU started a little slowly but still held the lead at 11-8, until Nielson scored seven points during an 11-2 run that gave the 'Saders a 22-10 advantage. Nielson led the way in the first half, shooting 6-7 from the field and scoring 15 points as NNU took a 49-39 lead into halftime. Trevecca used a 9-0 run over the end of the first half and the start of the second half to cut the lead to 49-43 before LaMark Judkins and Thomas took over.

Thomas nailed a pair of three-pointers and added a layin that was followed by a Judkins three-ball as the shot clock expired to give NNU a 60-44 lead, further inciting an already raucous crowd. The three pointers

continued to fall the rest of the way as Elijah Effinger and Jon Bussell each added one of their own to push the lead to 87-71. In all NNU

made eight three-pointers in the second half as they cruised to the 95-77 win. Judkins led all scorers with 17, including 5-8 from downtown. Thomas added 14 points with 12

coming in the second half. Jeremy Stockett poured in 12 points and had 9 boards, and Josh Cooprider had 5 assists

Following the win Coach Rich Sanders said, "You couldn't ask for a better way to start after last year, to get our confidence going and belief in our system and each other."

On Saturday night, NNU hosted Cal State Monterey Bay. The Otters, who won 27 games en-route to a national tournament bid, barely resembled that former team following a 37-point loss to Albertson the previous night.

The Otters, who use a five-

guard lineup, caused some match-up problems as our post players Stockett and Nielson had to guard against three-pointers.

NNU went on a 10-2 run to take a 29-17 lead and led comfortably the rest of the half, despite an 80-foot buzzer beater by Jon Breazeal to end the half and cut the lead to 47-33.

> In the second half the 'Saders looked a little bit flat as though they did not have much emotion. Though the 'Saders pushed the lead to twenty at 59-39 with 14:48 remaining, they were outplayed the rest of the half as the Otters could seemingly do no wrong.

The Otters went on a 19-10 run to cut it to 69-58

Then, in the last five minutes, the Otters put together another run to cut it to 82-79 with 47.3 seconds left. Cooprider made one of two free-throws to push it to 83-79. Following a pair of freethrows, the Otters cut it to 83-81.

Kelly Herron went to the line with a chance to make the win certain, but only made 1 of 2, giving the Otters one last chance. Following an errant shot, Thomas grabbed the rebound to ice the game and the Saders went on to win 86-81

James Thomas said, "Though we did not play very well in the second half, we can still use this experience to our benefit for upcoming games against tough teams.

Stockett led NNU with 18 points and five boards, Bussell







Senior Staci Kirk-Carter drives down the baseline, looking for the basket. Kirk-Carter scored a total of 45 points this weekend.



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
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
