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

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#### "SHALL WE SEE IT."

"I am praying the Lord to not let me die until I see a great revival sweep over this country," said a prominent minister in our pulpit the other day. Doubtless there are a few devout spirits throughout the church who are earnestly praying and looking for such an awakening, but we believe that so far as the masses are concerned, they are no longer desiring or expecting an event of this kind. Were such a visitation from Heaven granted most of the people would be surprised. For they are not in a condition to either desire or see the need of it. The Prophet Isaiah saw neither his own condition nor that of the people until illuminated by a vision of Jehovah's holiness. "Cheap daubers are we in this day; putting clay where there ought to be granite; building on "wood, hay and stubble" which will go up in smoke later on; "crying peace when there is no peace and healing the hurt of the daughter of my people slightly." It takes a vision of God to make us cry out "O Lord, revive Thy work!"

The majority of this generation never saw revival. There have been gracious awakengs and blessed manifestations of the Spirit various localities, but the present genera-

tion has never seen a widespread Pentecostal awakening. A few of the old people like those in Ezra's day remember the former glory, but the younger generation has no such thrilling memory. They have grown up amid adverse influences and have never witnessed a great sin-killing, spirit-quickening revival and, in a sense, have never had a real good chance to be saved. What multitudes would be brought to Christ could we only have such a revival as has swept over the church in other countries. To this end we should work and pray. Who will lead such a revival it matters not. God will see to this. When the time comes there will be a leader ready. We poor mortals have so much of the hero worship in us we are very prone to magnify the creature above creator. History never repeats itself in the kind of men thrust forth to lead in great religious awakenings, but the Lord raises them up in harmony with the needs of the world. Is there a law to be given; is there a nation to be trained? Then a chosen, disciplined instrument like Moses comes to the front. If the Gospel could be pioneered among Gentile nations, amid all the difficulties and complex problems growing out of a conflict with Judaism on the one hand and heathenism on the other, then a heroic Catholic spirit and many-sided mind like a Paul is needed. Is it a voice to proclaim to vast multitudes in the simple language of the people, then it is a Spurgeon or a Moody. Is it a John the Baptist to go up and down throughout the land awakening or scorching and blistering with the most terrible and effective denunciations, puncturing the foibles of the people until they are ashamed of their sins. then it is a Sam Jones. Is it a deeper work still, the work of holiness, then it is a Fletcher, a Palmer, or such like.

Now as to methods it doesn't matter as much as we sometimes vainly imagine. For grace flows through all kinds of channels and God descends to work with all kinds of instruments. Perhaps we never display our ignorance of spiritual truth more than in expecting God to repeat methods in the manner of his work. Certain methods were prominent in a mighty religious movement and we foolishly expect the same to be used in the next, not considering that the methods change with the times. Who ever dreamed of a revival running along the lines followed in the recent awakening in Wales. Big preachers, committees and stereotyped agencies were set aside, and the methods were born of the hour for that peculiar emergency. Sampson's jaw bone did effective work at the time needed, but if it had not been lost. little fellows would now be running all over the country trying to win the battle with the jaw bone of an ass. Moses used a Shepherd's rod in humbling Egypt, and it is a blessed thing for us that it cannot be found any longer, lest the country would be full of folks using crooked sticks. It is methods gotten on this wise that disgust people. Some of us are such miserable imitators that we are slaves to the methods of others, thinking that therein lies the secret of success. We have known people even to go so far as to steal the voices of other folks; and personal

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Those higher critics of the Jehoiakim type. who try to whittle away at the Bible, never had, and never will have a revival. The stern truths of the Bible as well as the tender messages of love must be boldly declared if there is anything like a moral upheaval. Little, tame sermonettes interspersed with the screechings of a godless choir will hardly create a ripple of conviction, much less break up the great deep of the heart. We believe that a spirit-filled ministry, declaring the whole counsel of God, would soon see such an awakening among the people as the present generation has never witnessed. The Word is yet the hammer with which to break into pieces the hardest heart, and when wielded by the Divinely anointed marvelous will be the result (Jer. 23:29). There is no use neglecting the Word and trifling with souls for it always ends in failure. People must take sides with God against their own sins as well as sin at large. There must be no covering up or dodging of the issue. A righteous movement is one of the accompaniments of every great work of the Spirit. Many are prone to overlook the ethical features of a real revival. When God manifests Himself in a marked degree debts will be paid, family altars established, quarrels settled, secret sins forsaken, wrongs righted, the Scriptures honored, duties discharged and God loved and served. We have reason to fear that now-a-days many efforts are made for revivals right over the head of unconfessed and unforsaken sin without the depths of the heart ever having been broken up, or the need of Christ anything like fully realized. Professions may be gotten in this way, but there will never be a Christlike character built up on such a foundation. This is the trouble with much of the so-called Christianity of today. It is weighed in the balance and found wanting. People have chosen the popular rather than the weath route to the cross, but it is the cross of men's devising rather than that of Calvary. People who come by way of the thunder of Sinai and the pleadings of Calvary get some where and how they do appreciate it. They have been saved from something, they are brands plucked from the burning and their hearts respond to the exclamation of the poet:

Were the whole realm of nature mine, That were a present far too small, Love so amazing, so divine, Demands my soul, my life, my all.

They will assert themselves more or less as long as people are in a raw, undeveloped state, but the church as a whole is in a hundred fold more danger of being frozen out than of being burned out. Fanaticism has slain its dozens while formalism has slain its thousands. It is truly pathetic to see how a cold church dreads fanaticism; while greater evils are hugged complacently to their breast. Mr. Wesley, after having witnessed one great revival, prayed the Lord to send another minus the faults of the first one, but he closed his prayer by asking for another with faults and all rather than not to have any, and to this we add a hearty Amen. The man who stands off at a distance and coldly criticises the irregularities and mistakes cropping out of the great religious upheaval is like the man

who stands off and finds fault with the maneuvers of the heroic firemen as they are trying to save life and property from devouring flames. The Lord needs a great revival. Infidelity will skulk back to its kennel in the face of supernatural demonstrations. 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


