## Dean Culbertson To Be Lecturer



Dr. Paul T. Culbertson, Dean of Pasadena College, will be the speaker for the annual Student Council Lectures April 13-17.

The general theme of the lectures will be "The Mature Christian." The chapel talks, to be given at 11:00 A.M. daily, will deal with the general relation of evangelical Christian experience to practical problems of human relations and adjustment. The evening message will deal with certain aspects of our faith which appear to be of special relevance to Christian young people in our day.

Dr. Culbertson was born March 13, 1905. He attended the University of California, Berkeley, from 1927 to 1932 and received the A.B. and M.A. degrees, majoring in psychology. He received the Ph.D. degree from the University of Oregon in 1940 with emphases in history and education.

He has taught history in the University of Oregon and has taught history, psychology, and theology in Pasadena College. He has been Dean of Pasadena College of Liberal Arts since 1949.

Dr. Culbertson is also known as a writer. He has written *Introduction to Christian Theology* (with H. Orton Wiley), *Building A Bridge To a Better World*, and numerous articles in the *Herald of Holiness*.

He is married and has one son, (cont. on page 2)

Greathouse of Trevecca Nazarene College. Everyone who knows Professor Greathouse loves and appreciates the depths of his Christian experience and his devotion to God.

Professor Greathouse as a Theologian and Bible scholar has a vast storehouse of knowledge of his subject and writes as one having authority. Every person, young and old, will find a source of inspiration and wisdom if they will take advantage of the opportunity to present this program in their N. Y. P. S.

This lesson discusses the study of the Bible as a whole and also by individual books. Major emphasis is placed on the use of study "helps."

The importance of the Bible in our daily Christian life is pointed out. Our youth of today do not know their Bible as well as they do secular material and, therefore, an interest in Bible and the tools for studying it must be created so that our youth will realize "that the Bible, when intelligently read and prayerfully studied, is the most thrilling Book in the world."
